Chair of Westasian History at the University of Erfurt Professor Birgit Schaebler visits LERC

The Lebanese Emigration Research Center welcomed to its premises Professor Birgit Schaebler, Professor of History and Chair of Westasian History at the University of Erfurt in Germany.

Highly educated with stints at Berkeley, University of California, and a Master's in History, Islamic Studies, Political Science from the University of Erlangen-Nuremberg, Professor Schaebler stayed on at Erlangen-Nuremberg to obtain her Ph.D. in History, with minors in Islamic Studies and Political Science in 1994.

A prolific writer, Professor Schaebler has published numerous books dealing with history, globalization, culture, ethnicity, integration, Muslims, Islam, and religion, especially in Syria and Iran. Her many articles, although studying different countries, all touch upon the same themes gaining her a widely respected recognition in her chosen fields.

She has been awarded various fellowships, scholarships, research affiliations, membership in professional associations, as well as being a much sought-after lecturer and international conference participator.
